An A-Z of Historical Heroes

The students in Room 28 are flying high with their term 3 inquiry projects about heroes who made history. We started by collating an A-Z list of our favourite historical and fictional heroes. After much discussion and debate, students voted on the key characteristics that make someone a hero. We decided that heroes are usually, kind and self-less, mentally or physically strong, courageous, and have a high degree of integrity. We later we also added the qualities of wisdom, and activism (acting to change broader social problems). Already, we realised that many people we initially called heroes, were only celebrities or idols.

Students were challenged to complete a 50-word bio of their heroes. This required them to summarise large amounts of information and research succinctly and effectively—a very important inquiry skill. We presented our work as Hero fact-files and rated each hero against our "qualities".

The next stage of our inquiry required us to obtain further information. Students researched a second hero and created a poem using the challenging Sonnet style. It was a difficult balance to match the "a, b, a, b" rhyming scheme whilst sticking to the syllable count for each line. The students did an amazing job bring their heroes to light in truly epic pieces of poetry.

They then created a companion art piece to accompany their poems using water colours to create an authentic portrait of each individual hero.
