

Kia ora e te whānau,

We started our first assembly with a reminder for every child of our school values: *Kaitiakitanga*, *Innovation and Truth*. The start of our year has been an opportunity for us to bring those values to life. Digital Citizenship Notices

Parnell District School uses digital devices to support and extend the curriculum, enhancing learning for all students. Students in year 0-3 will, at times, use class devices, while children in year 4-8 will either use their own device as part of the BYOD programme, or a school issued device. Information about how the school keeps children safe online, expectations for children, and expectations for whānau are summarised in the *Digital Citizenship Agreement* form that is coming home in your children's bags today. Please take time to read through this with your child, explain their expectations, and return it to school when you have agreed to the expectations.

Reporting in 2023

We work hard to give you a full picture about how your child is working at school. To do this, we split our two reports into four reports in 2020. This means you get information about your child every term, with a different focus each term. For 2023, you will get four reports.

Term 1 Focus: Student learning behaviors and work ethic in class.

You'll get a report from your class teacher focusing on how they are working in class, how they are showing the school values, and their relationships with classmates.

Term 2 Focus: Literacy and Math

A report using the Ministry of Education developed PaCT tool, showing their current achievement and progress over time in Literacy and Math. These reports are made based on PAT testing results, months of ongoing formative assessment, and monitoring of student work by our teachers. We are aware that understanding achievement as it relates to the New Zealand Curriculum is difficult. We provide these reports before teacher conferences, so parents have a chance to read what the report includes, then discuss with their teacher what report indicates regarding achievement and progress.

Term 3 Focus: Work habits and achievement across the curriculum

Revisiting the work habits reported on in term one, to let you know how your child is working in class, as well as indicating their current achievement in other curriculum areas, including Health and PE, Science, Design Thinking and Social Sciences.

Term 4 Focus: Literacy and Math

Using the Ministry of Education's PaCT reporting, revisiting the mid-year judgements made by teachers showing the progress children have made over the second half of the year in Literacy and Math.

Start of year reminders

We want to make sure our community are clear about our school's expectations so that we can avoid difficulties for students and families later in the year. While there should be no new information below, we'd suggest you talk through this information with your child, so they know all relevant expectations

School hours

No children should be on site before 8:30 am, or after school after 3:15pm. Some children may be on site with their parents supervising them, but for the safety of our community no unsupervised children should be on site before or after school. The school is unable to supervise children before 8:30 am as teachers prepare for learning, or after 3:15 pm. If your child is regularly on site before or after school unsupervised, they will be sent to C4 and charges will apply.

Bells indicate our learning times, with the first block starting at 8:55am. Our break times are: Morning tea: 10:40 am eating time, 10:50 - 11:10 am play time

Lunch: 12:40 pm eating time, 12:50 - 1:30 pm play time.

The school day ends at 3:00 pm

Uniform

The school uniform expectations are outlined on the school website, and at the end of this newsletter. Some common reminders I give to children are


- No children should be wearing **jewelry** at school. Children may wear a watch, and one pair of stud earrings. No bracelets, necklaces, or other jewelry. If your child wears specific cultural jewelry, please send a note outlining its significance to your class teacher.
- You must have a **hat** for break times and any outdoor learning in term 1 and 4. It can be any hat if you don't have the official school hat, provided it is blue, has a brim right around the hat, and doesn't have any branding or logos on it. No caps.
- Children can wear **shoes** or sandals most days, but on days when they are in the STEAM room, they must we closed toe shoes.
- Anyone's **hair** that touches their collar must be tied up.
- Any visible undergarments should be black, navy blue or white.

School App

Sign up for the school app. It is often the most timely way the school communicates with whānau, and shares information.

When looking for the app in the app store, look for <u>SchoolAppsNZ</u>, and then add Parnell School. Remember to choose the year group and room number that applies to your children.
